JESUS' GOLDEN RULE

A. Introduction.

▶ Jesus's teaching in the Sermon on the Mount "fulfills" plēroō the Law and the Prophets (5:17), while the Golden Rule, which he instituted "sums up" the Law and the Prophets (7:12).

B. Setting.

- In contrast to Confucianism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Judaism, or even the Hillel, Jesus was the first to truly state the Golden Rule in a positive nuance.
- "Treat others as you want to be treated" the same way in two ways.

1. Do not judge (vv.1-6)

- a) Judge not, but, be discerning of right and wrong (vv.1-2).
- ▶ To overcome tendency to judge others, consider these two things.
- b) Jesus helps us "do **not** judge" with 2 hyperbolic questions:
- (1) v.3.
- (2) v.4.

Explanation

▶ The passage today hinges on the key verse in verse 12 "do to others what you would have them do to you."

Explanation

The golden rule as uttered by Jesus is derived from Leviticus 19:18, which is regarded as the great positive commandment "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (clearly stated in Matthew 22:29).

Lesson 1:

▶ Do not be like a judge in relationship to others.

- 1) God is the judge (Ps.75:7: Isa.33:22)
- 2) God sees the whole picture and the hidden motives.
- scrutinizing other people's small issues, while ignoring our own very large issues.
- devote ourselves to help others rather than dealing with our own baggage.

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- v.5: To grow in holiness with fewer planks and specks all around.
- v.6: Exercising discernment.

2. Ask, Seek, Knock from the Answering Father (vv.7-11)

- a) vv.7-8: present imperative verbs: keep asking, seeking, knocking.
- b) vv.9-11: the <u>basis</u> that Jesus makes this promise in verses 7-8.

3. Golden Rule (v.12).

Practice the Golden Rule "in everything," involves faithful persistence.

C. Conclusion.

❖ Lesson 2:

 Jesus's admonitions should lead us to deeper self-examination and confession.

Explanation

- Each *verb* describes practical faith in God.
- Jesus makes this promise on the basis of our relationship with our Father in heaven who knows to give good gifts to his children.

Lesson 3:

- Jesus uses a <u>rabbinical argument</u>
 (a fortiori) in v.11: from the
 lesser to the greater: a lesson
 of God's assurance to us.
- (2) The connection between v.7 and 6:33 shows how God's promises come into reality when we put them into practice out of faith.

Lesson 4:

- The embodiment of the Golden Rule is done on the basis of God's grace, the surpassing righteousness of Christ that's given to us: we live to love God and to love our neighbor.
- Practice Jesus' Golden Rule of the kingdom in our church, community, home and workplace
